

Artistic Director's Notes

Theatre is a collaborative art form. In the business world, there's a lot of talk these days about the 'supply chain' and how critical it is for businesses to maintain good relationships and keep options open in order for their companies to survive. Well, we theatre folk have been doing that for about 2,500 years! We know that the focus of an artist is constantly being drawn inward. For a writer or a painter or a photographer, definitely so. But also, I think for performing artists. We fall easily into the trap of familiarity and self-satisfaction. If its important to me, it must be important to everyone. If it works for me, keep on doing it. But that can lead to stagnation and increasingly diminishing returns. That is why, in my opinion, while the best single instances of art may be the work of a single mind, a single vision, the most long-lasting artists are those that make themselves open to the winds of change.

One of the stories I love to tell (and do, frequently!) has to do with a production we did a few years ago of the classic American musical, *Man of La Mancha*. I talked to a director from Bosnia about directing the play. Her response was "Never heard of it." My response was "You're hired!" It would have been easy to pick someone who knew the play well, who perhaps had directed it before, who was clear on what the story was about, what it meant. But I wanted to go another direction. I wanted to find out *what else* was in that story. The result was one of our finest productions. Getting to the end result was a bit like walking over a slippery lake of ice. Because the footing was so treacherous, each step along the way was precise, carefully thought out, and directly to the point. No side trips, no deviations, just the question: "What is this play about?" It worked and our audiences got to hear a great, meaningful, emotionally moving story as if for the first time. Mission accomplished.

That is what collaboration at its best can do. Bring together different points of view, not to vie, not to engage in a tug-of-war that leaves one side humbled in the mud, but rather a removal of the extraneous in both points of view, revealing the heart of the thing. There are a lot of big ideas in *Being Chaka*, a lot of concerns that hover near the front of all our minds today. My hope in partnering with TEA Artistry is that the extraneous will be washed away and a shining question will remain. That, as artists, is all we have to offer.

Miriam Tabb holds a B.A. in Theatre from The City College of New York.

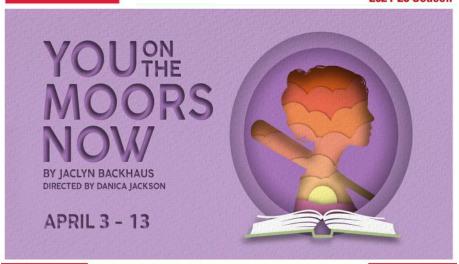
